1. John Woodcock Graves (1795-1886)

John Woodcock Graves was an English woolen mill owner, composer, and the author of *D'ye ken John Peel*.

On knowing Obama: D' ye ken Obama with his mask so gay?

D' ye ken Obama at the break of day?
D' ye ken *Obama* when he's far far away
With his *POLDS*-hound in the morning?

'Twas the sound of *their evils* brought me from my bed, And the cries of his POLD-hounds, has me oft times misled;

Or the fox from his lair in the morning.¹

2. John Keats (1795-1827)

The English Romantic poet John Keats ranks with Lord Byron and Percy Bysshe Shelley as a most famous poet of the second generation of English Romantic poets even though his works were published only four years before his death. After his death he became world famous. His poetry (odes) is mainly concerned with the sensual aspects of human life.

Satanic Obama to Americans:

Alfred Bunn was an English theatrical manager who achieved renown as the stagemanager of Drury Lane Theatre, London in 1823, the Theatre Royal in Birmingham, 1826, and the joint management of Drury Lane and Covent Garden, London in 1833.

4. David Hartley Coleridge (1796-1849)

David Hartley Coleridge, the eldest son of the poet Samuel Taylor Coleridge, was an English biographer, educator, essayist and poet. His contributions to English literature are his works of criticism, an unfinished lyric drama titled *Prometheus*, and his sonnets. Probably his most famous work is his dual biography of the English dramatists Phillip Massinger (1583-1640) and John Ford, (1586-1639), published in 1839.

- On American Patriotism and Freedom:

The soul of the *patriot* is larger than the sky, Deeper than ocean, or the abysmal dark of the unfathomed center.²⁷

But what is Freedom? Rightly understood, A universal license to be good.²⁸

5. Horace Mann (1796-1859)

The American reformer of education Horace Mann served in the Massachusetts House of Representatives from 1827 to 1833 and in the Massachusetts Senate from 1834 to 1837, and as Secretary of the Massachusetts State Board of Education 1837-1848. He was elected to the US House of Representatives, 1848-1853. He served as President of Antioch College 1852-1859. Horace Mann was a brother-inlaw to author Nathaniel Hawthorne.

- On America's loss of liberty: Lost, November 2008, somewhere between sunrise and sunset, non-golden hours, each set with sixty destructive minutes. No reward is offered, for liberty is gone forever.²⁹
- Call to American Patriots: Be ashamed to die until you have won some victory for *America*.³⁰

6. James Robinson Planché (1796-1880)

James Robinson Planché, a British antiquary, dramatist, and officer of arms, adapted, collaborated on, and wrote 176 plays over a period of 60 years in the genres of burletta, comedy, extravaganza, farce, melodramas, and opera. emphasized the necessity of using historically accurate costumes in the presentation of plays. He is also known for his expert publications on historical costumes.

On Obama's honesty: It would have made a cat laugh.³¹

9. Sam Slick [Thomas Chandler Haliburton] (1796-1865)

Thomas Chandler Haliburton, a Canadian judge and author, created the character Beginning in 1836, Sam Slick of Slicksville, with his wise-cracking commentary, wry wit, and Yankee thinking wrote about his views on human nature in a regular column in the Novascotian. The Clockmaker, or the Sayings and Doings of Samuel Slick of Slicksville consists of twenty-one sketches that were published in a collection titled First Series in 1836. It was supplemented by an additional 12 unpublished or new sketches.

10. Thomas Haynes Bayly (1797-1839)

Thomas Haynes Bayly, English author, dramatist, poet, and songwriter, wrote for the stage and the periodical press. He composed and wrote hundreds of songs, as well as novels and farces. His most famous songs are songs include Old House at

- On what America was before Obama: Tell me the tales that to me were so dear, Long, long ago, long, long ago.³³

11. Heinrich Heine (1797-1856)

Heinrich Heine whose birth name was Harry Heine changed his name to Christian Johann Heinrich Heine upon his conversion to Christianity from Judaism. Heine is definitely one of the most significant 19th century-German poets, as well as essayist, journalist, and literary critic. His lyric poetry (*Lieder* = art songs) was set to music by composers such as Robert Schumann and Franz Schubert. Heine's later poems and prose contain satirical wit and irony throughout. His radical political views led to many of his works being banned in Germany because they contained radical, political views concerning democratic republicanism. Heine lived the last 25 years of his life as an expatriate in Paris.

- Obama bout himself: I'm a knight of the satanic spirit.³⁸
- On Obama burning the Constitution: Wherever they destroy such papers they will also, in the end, burn human beings.³⁹

- To POLDS: Mark this well, you ... men of action: you are nothing but the unwitting agents of the men of thought who often, in quiet self-effacement, mark out most exactly all your doings in advance,⁴⁰
- On what America was before Obama: People in those old times had convictions;
 the moderns only have opinions. And it needs more than a mere opinion to
 erect a Gothic cathedral.⁴¹
- On Obama's regime: Wild, dark times are rumbling toward us, and the
 prophet who wishes to write a new apocalypse will have to invent entirely new
 beasts, and beasts so terrible that the ancient animal symbols of Saint John
 will seem like cooing doves and cupids in comparison.⁴²

The future smells of *satanic* leather, of blood, of godlessness and of much whipping. I advise our grandchildren to come into the world with very thick skin on their backs.⁴³

- On Obama's intelligence: Ordinarily he is insane, but he has lucid moments when he is only stupid.⁴⁴
- On freedom under the Obama regime: So we keep asking, over and over,

Until a handful of earth

Stops mouths -

But is that an answer?⁴⁵

- Obama on God forgiving: Of course He will forgive me; that's his business. (Bien sûr, il me pardonnera; c'est son métier.)⁴⁶

12. Mary Wollstonecraft Shelley (1797-1851)

- Satan on Obama: I beheld the wretch – the miserable monster whom I had created.⁴⁷

13. Sojourner Truth [Isabella Van Wagener] (c. 1797-1883)

Sojourner Truth Gave herself the name from 1843 onward. She was born a slave and named Isabella Baumfree. She escaped to freedom with her daughter in 1826. She filed court charges against the owner of her son and won the victory, the first black woman to win such a case against a white man. Sojourner Truth was an African-American abolitionist and women's rights activist. Her best-known freedelivery (without notes) speech on gender inequalities is *Ain't I a Woman?*, which she

delivered at the Ohio Women's Rights Convention in Akron, Ohio in 1851. Sojourner Truth helped recruit black troops for the Union Army during the Civil War. She was unsuccessful in securing land grants from the federal government for former slaves after the Civil War.

- On the situation in America under Obama: Is God dead?⁴⁸
- On sexual equality better than Obama can speak about it: That man says that women need to be helped into carriages, and lifted over ditches, and to have the best place everywhere.  On political theft under Obama: The rich obots rob the poor and the other poor obots rob one another.⁵¹

14. Auguste Comte (1798-1857)

Auguste Comte (Isidore Auguste Marie François Xavier Comte) was a French philosopher. He founded the discipline of sociology and the doctrine of positivism, which teaches that in the natural and social sciences information is derived from sensory experience. Data from logics and mathematics are the singular source of authoritative knowledge.

- American citizens under the Obama regime: The dead govern the living.⁵²

15. August Heinrich Hoffmann [Hoffmann von Fallersleben] (1798-1874)

August Heinrich Hoffmann von Fallersleben was a German poet. His pen name was Hoffmann von Fallersleben. His best known poem is *Das Lied der Deutschen*, for the lines *Deutschland*, *Deutschland*, *über alles*. The song's third stanza without *Deutschland*, *über alles* is now the national anthem of Germany. The music was composed by Joseph Hayden in 1797.

16. Jules Michelet (1798-1874)

The French historian Jules Michelet was born in Paris. His family were Huguenots, members of the Protestant Reformed Church of France coming out of the 16th and 17th centuries. In *Histoire de France* (*History of France*, 1855), Jules Michelet was the first historian to use and define the word Renaissance (Re-birth in the French language). He described it as a period in Europe's cultural history that represented a break from the Middle Ages, because it created a modern understanding of humanity and the role of humankind in the world.

On what POLDS do not know about politics: What is the first part of politics?
 Education. The second? Education. And the third? Education.⁵⁴

17. Dionysios Solomos (1798-1857)

Dionysios Solomos, Greek poet from Zakynthos, Greece is best known for writing the *Hymn to Liberty*. It (the first two stanzas) became the Greek national anthem in 1865. It was set to music by Nikolaos Mantzaros. Dionysios Solomos is considered the national poet of Greece because he showed the influence of Greek and Greece in modern literature. It is interesting to note that that only the *Hymn to Liberty* was completed. Practically nothing that he wrote was published during his lifetime.

On American Liberty: We knew thee of old,

O divinely restored,
By the light of thine eyes
And the light of thy sword.

From the graves of our slain Shall thy valor prevail As we greet thee again – Hail, Liberty! Hail!⁵⁵

- On the destruction of America under Obama: On the blackened spine of America,

18. Amos Bronson Alcott (1799-1888)

Amos Bronson Alcott was an American educator, philosopher, reformer, and writer. Alcott focused on a conversational style in educating students. He also avoided traditional punishment as a disciplinary measure. His goal was to perfect the human

19. Honoré de Balzac (1799-1850)

Honoré de Balzac was a French novelist and playwright. He is famous for his sequence of short stories and novels collectively entitled *La Comédie humaine* (*The Human Comedy*, 1842). The collection presents a panorama of French life in the years after the 1815 fall of Napoleon, It is his *magnum opus*.

20. Simon Cameron (1799-1889)

The American politician Simon Cameron served as United States Secretary of War for Abraham Lincoln at the start of the American Civil War. Cameron made his fortune in canals, banking, and railways. In 1845 he became senator for the state of Pennsylvania, succeeding James Buchanan. Failing to secure a nomination for senator from the Know-Nothing party, and joined the People's Party, the Republican Party's name in Pennsylvania. He won the Senate seat again in 1857. He was a Republican nomination for the presidential election in 1860.

- On why Obama is an honest politician: An honest politician is one who when he's bought stays bought.⁶¹

21. Rufus Choate (1799-1859)

Ranked among the greatest trial lawyers of his era, Rufus Choate (1799-1859) was also an active participant in American politics. His brilliant legal mind and flamboyant oratorical skills helped him win numerous high-profile courtroom battles. As a United States representative and senator, Choate opposed sectional extremists and fought for the preservation of the Union.

22. Thomas Hood (1799-1845)

Thomas Hood was an English humorist and poet. Hood's most famous work is a poem titled *The Song of the Shirt*, a lament for a poor London seamstress. She made shirts to support her ill child. However, the proceeds of her sales had to be given to her employer. The poem became a popular song. It inspired social activists to lobby for countless laboring women living in poverty.

26. Thomas Babington, Lord Macaulay (1800-1859)

Thomas Babington Macaulay, 1st Baron Macaulay, was a British historian and politician. His books on British history are literary masterpieces. He was Secretary at War between 1839 and 1841 and Paymaster-General between 1846 and 1848. He is considered the reformer of Indian education system. Among his achievements were the replacement of Persian by English as the official language; the use of English as the medium of instruction in all schools; and the training of English-speaking Indians as teachers. Concerning historical movements, Macaulay divided the world into civilized nations and barbarism.

 On government: That is the best government which desires to make the people happy, and knows how to make them happy.⁸⁶

Free trade, one of the greatest blessings which a government can confer on a people, is in almost every country unpopular.⁸⁷

He was a rake among false scholars and a false scholar among rakes. 106

30. David Glasgow Farragut (1801-1870)

David Glasgow Farragut, a flag officer of the United States Navy during the American Civil War, was the America's first rear admiral, vice admiral, and admiral. He is remembered for his order at the Battle of Mobile Bay: Damn the torpedoes, full speed ahead!

On Obama's supporters: Damn the POLDs – full speed ahead!¹²¹

31. John Henry Cardinal Newman (1801-1890)

John Henry Newman (also Cardinal Newman or Blessed John Henry Newman) was an important figure in the religious history of England in the 19th century. His hymns include Lead, *Kindly Light* and *Praise to the Holiest in the Height*.

31. Brigham Young (1801-1880)

He was also the first governor of the Utah Territory. Young was also instrumental in the founding of the University of Utah and Brigham Young University.

Lydia Maria Child was an American abolitionist, Indian rights activist, journalist, novelist, an opponent of American expansionism, women's rights activist, and a Unitarian. Her journals, fiction and domestic manuals shocked her wide audience because she wrote about male dominance and white supremacy in some of her stories. She is most remembered for her poem, Over the River and Through the Woods about Thanksgiving. Lydia Maria Child's grandfather's house was restored by Tufts University in 1976.

Morris was popular as a poet and songwriter. His best poem was turned into the song *Woodman, Spare that Tree!* (Original title: *The Oak*, 1837) It was set to music by Henry Russell in 1837. George Poipe Morris also published a volume of collected poems, *The Deserted Bride and Other Poems* in 1838, which ran into several editions. Morris' only work of prose is *The Little Frenchman and His Water Lots* (1839).

36. Edward Bulwer-Lytton, Baron Lytton (1803-1873)

Edward George Earle Lytton Bulwer-Lytton, 1st Baron Lytton, English novelist, playwright, poet and politician, wrote bestselling novels which earned him a considerable fortune. He coined the phrases "the great unwashed", "pursuit of the almighty dollar" (which is no longer mighty!), "the pen is mightier than the sword", and "It was a dark and stormy night", the opening line to his 1830 novel *Paul Clifford*.
