Homer (c. 850/700 BC?)

Homer is considered to be the greatest of the ancient Greek poets. His exact dates are unknown. Herodotus places him at c. 850 BC. Other sources claim that the time of the Trojan War is more likely. He has been titled the *Teacher of Greece*. Nothing definitive is known about his person.

THE ILIAD

The ILIAD is the oldest written work in western literature. It is an epic poem set in the years of the Trojan War (12th or 13th century BC). The ILIAD tells a part of the last year of the ten-year siege of Troy. The word *Iliad* means *a poem about Ilion*, which is another nomenclature for *Troy*. Ancient Troy was located in northwestern Anatolia, somewhat

southeast of the Dardanelles and near Mount Ida, in the Turkish province of Çanakkale. The city is both historical fact and being intermixed with the epics of the Greek gods, it is also historical legend. Troy is best known as the historical setting for the Trojan War.

This is the origin of the concept of the epic journey in English that we know as the odyssey. The original poem may have been memorized and recited in the oral tradition. The earliest papyrus fragments of the poem date back to the third century BC. The *Laurentianus Manuscript* (10th? or 12th? century) is the oldest complete manuscript.

- Then dark death seized Obama, as soon as he had seen the truth in his whole life.²⁴

Hesiod's writings are considered to be the prime source of Greek agricultural technology, archaic Greek astronomy, early recording of time, and early economic thought, for which he has received the recognition of being the world's first economist.

Mimnermus (c. 650-c. 590 BC)

Mimnermus was famous for his short poems that were often recited at wine drinking parties. He is also considered to be the first Greek love poet.

- Obama's motto: What life is there, what delight, without my politics?34

The Seven Sages (c. 650-550 BC)

The Seven Sages were supposedly wise philosophers, statesmen, and legislators (law givers) of the 6th century BC. They are:

- Cleobus the tyrant of Lindos on the island of Rhodos. (c.600 BC)
- Solon (640-559 BC) was a famous legislator, democrat, and reformer of Athens.
- Chilon, a Spartan politician who militarized Sparta's society. (6th century BC)
- Bias, a politician and legislator of Priene. (6th century BC)
- Thales, philosopher and mathematician. (c. 624–625-c. 547–546BC)
- Pittacus, of Lesbos. He reduced the influence of the nobility. (c. 640-568 BC)
- Periander, the tyrant of Corinth, but the reason for its stability as a Greek city state. (7th to 6th century BC)

Only Thales of Miletus can be considered a philosopher. The other men were definitely not of the philosophical mien. The chosen sayings all apply to what Obama should do, but does not, and will never do.

Solon (c. 638-c.5599 BC)

Anacharsis (Flourished c. 600 BC)

The Scythian philosopher Anacharsis came from the northern region of the Black Sea. He is a forerunner of the cynic school of thought. None of his complete works have survived history. All that we know of his *writings* are the result of traditional historical references. We know that he was the first foreigner who became an Athenian citizen

- Americans on learning that Obama seeks re-election: *The Americans* are just that distance from death.⁴⁸

- He who knows does not speak. He who speaks like Obama does not know. 54

Epimenides (Sixth Century BC)

Epimenides was a mystical Greek seer and philosopher from the island of Knossos (Crete). He is probably the forerunner of the Rip Van Winkle figure. It is said that while tending sheep he fell asleep for fifty-seven years in a cave that was sacred to Zeus. When he awoke he had prophetic capabilities.

- Any excuse will serve a tyrant. 62

- The shaft of the arrow had been feathered with one of the eagle's own plumes. We often give our enemies the means of our own destruction.⁶⁴

Theognis (Flourished c. 545 BC)

Theognis (of Megara) is known for his gnomic poetry, the content of which is ethical maxims and advice on how to live a practical life.

- *Obama* adopts the character of a twisting octopus, which takes on the appearance of the nearby rock, *then* follows in this direction, now turns a different direction. ⁶⁵

Xenophanes (c. 570-c. 475 BC)

Simonides (c. 556-468 BC)

Simonides of Ceos was a Greek lyric poet famous for his accounts of traditional, colorful life and his ability to describe human situations in beautiful simplicity. He is reputed to have been a wise man, a miser, and the inventor of the Greek letters ω , η , ξ , ψ .

- The hero patriots in Arlington National Cemetery: If to die honorably is the greatest / Part of virtue, for us fate's done her best. / Because we fought to crown *America* with freedom / We lie here enjoying timeless fame. ⁶⁸
- American patriots did not flinch but gave their lives to save America when her fate hung on Obama's razor edge.⁶⁹

Confucius (551-479 BC)

Confucius (Master Kong) was a Chinese philosopher who lived and flourished in the Chinese Spring and Autumn era, approximately 771-476 BC. His philosophy placed emphasis on moral government, correct behavior in social relationships, a respect for justice, and a belief in sincerity.

- Obama speaks without modesty and finds it difficult to make his words good. 75

Heraclitus (c.540-c.480 BC)

Heraclitus of Ephesus is famous for his belief in an ever-changing universe and in the unity of opposite forces; all existing things are characterized by contrasting properties.

Aeschylus (525-456 BC)

Aeschylus was the first Greek tragedian. Only seven of somewhere between seventy to ninety plays that he is said to have written have survived. He is known for expanding the number of characters in a play so that there would be more conflict. Aeschylus was the first to stop the characters from interacting with the play's chorus.

- For somehow *Obama* is tyranny's disease.⁸⁴

He then collapsed and died from exhaustion. It is highly improbable that the historical run from Marathon took place. We know that Plutarch (46-120) in his work *On the Glory of Athens* gives the first written account of such a run by a man named either Thersippus or Eukles. About one hundred years later Lucian (c. 125-180) wrote that Philippides, a possible misspelling, made the run.

Anaxagoras (c.500-428 BC)

Anaxagoras was famous for explaining eclipses, meteors, rainbows, and the sun with principles of science. He introduced the concept of *Nous*, the mind as a force of order. For him material substances contain imperishable primary elements which generate and disappear according to mixture and separation.

- To Obama personally: The descent to Hades is the same from every place. 90

THE PĀLI CANON (c. 500-c. 250 BC)

The Pāli Canon is the only complete, early Buddhist canon that has survived. It is a collection of writings in the Theravada tradition. It was written down in the Pāli language.

Sophocles (c. 495-406 BC)

Sophocles is one of the three most famous Greek tragedians, the other two being Aeschylus and Euripides. Of approximately 120 plays, only *Ajax*, *Antigone*, *Trachinian Women*, *Oedipus the King*, *Electra*, *Philoctetes*, and *Oedipus at Colonus* have survived.
