2. Persius [Aulus Persius Flaccus] (34-62)

Aulus Persius Flaccus was a Roman (Etruscan) poet and satirist. In his works, poems, and satires, he shows a strong criticism for the abuses of his contemporaries. He is famous for his stoic wisdom. After his death, Flaccus' works were published by his friend and mentor Lucius Annaeus Cornutus. They became very popular in the Middle Ages.

3. Gaius Petronius [Petronius Arbiter] (?-66)

It was made into a film (1969) by the Italian director Federico Fellini who presents a series of bawdy and satirical episodes set in Imperial Rome.

4. Quintilian [Marcus Fabius Quintilianus] (35-100)

Marcus Fabius Quintilianus' fame lies in his being a Roman rhetorician from Hispania. He was greatly estimated in medieval schools of rhetoric and in the writings of the renaissance. English translations refer to him as Quintilian, or the other spellings Quintillian and Quinctilian.

- Obama does not forget. A liar should have a good memory. 13
- Obama is not eloquent. It is feeling and force of imagination that makes us eloquent. Obama does not have these.¹⁴
- Those who wish to appear wise among fools, among the wise seem foolish.¹⁵

5. Flavius Josephus (37-95?)

Titus Flavius Josephus is also known by the name Joseph ben Matityahu. He was a first century Roman-Jewish historian and a writer of the biographies of holy people, saints, and ecclesiastical leaders. Flavius Josephus was of priestly and royal ancestry. His works on Jewish history place special emphasis on the first century AD and the First Jewish–Roman War that resulted in the Destruction of Jerusalem and its temple in 70 AD. The most important works are *The Jewish War* (c. 75), which tells of the Jewish revolt against Roman occupation (66–70), and *Antiquities of the Jews* (c. 94 CE), that relates the history of the world from a Jewish perspective. Both writings provide interesting background information on Early Christianity.

6. Eleazar ben Ja'ir (?-73)

Eleasar ben Ja'ir, sometimes written Eleazar Ben Ya'ir was among the last of the leaders of the Jewish defense on the high plane at Masada in 73 AD. The Romans eventually occupied the fortress but not before Eleasar ben Ja'ir convinced the Jewish rebels to commit collective suicide rather than surrender to Roma. His argument was that it would be better to die than to become slaves of Rome. He ordered that everything except the staples were to be burned. Then the men killed their wives and children. Ten men were then chosen who killed the others. Then one man was chosen to kill the remaining nine and himself. When the Romans came, they found 960 dead Jewish patriots and seven who had survived: two women and five children.

A behavior for American Patriots: Let us spare nothing, but our provisions.
For they will be a testimonial when we are dead, that we were not subdued for want of necessities; but that according to our original resolution, we have preferred death before slavery.¹⁷

7. Nero (37-68)

Nero was the last in the Julio-Claudian dynasty of Roman Emperors. Adopted by his great-uncle Claudius, Nero succeeded to the throne in 54 following Claudius' death. His reign is noted for the athletic games and the theaters, as well as his execution of his mother and step-brother. However, Nero has gone down in history as the originator of the great fire of Rome in 64 AD, in which most of Rome was destroyed. It was rumored then and argued now that Nero wanted to rebuild Rome according to his vision, one aspect of which was a personal palatial complex, the *Domus Aurea*. In 68 AD there were rebellions in Gaul and Hispania. Nero knew that he would be assassinated and therefore he committed suicide. One of his pastimes was having captured Christians burned in his garden at night for a source of light.

8. Lucan (39-65)

Marcus Annaeus Lucanus, Lucan, was a Roman poet. Born in Corduba in the Hispania and despite having lived a short life, Lucan is regarded as one of the most important contributors to the Imperial Latin period.

- On the United States of America under Obama:

9. Longinus (First century AD)

Longinus is known only for his writing *On the Sublime* that explores the effects of good writing. He was a Greek teacher of rhetoric and a literary critic.

10. Martial [Marcus Valerius Martialis] (40-104)

Marcus Valerius Martialis was a Latin poet from Hispania who is considered the creator of the modern epigram. He is best known for his book *Epigrams* that has short, witty poems in which Martial romanticizes his provincial upbringing and cheerfully satirizes Rome's city life and the scandals of his acquaintances. He wrote a total of 1,561 epigrams.

11. Titus Vespasianus (41-81)

Titus, Roman Emperor from 79 to 81 and a member of the Flavian dynasty, succeeded his father Vespasian upon his death. He is the first Roman Emperor to be emperor immediately after his own father, thus becoming the first Roman Emperor to come to the throne after his own father. Titus was a famous military commander in the First Jewish-Roman War. The Arch of Titus commemorates his victory: the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple of Jerusalem. Also, Titus was prefect of the Praetorian Guard. He is also known for his love affair with the Jewish queen Berenice. As Emperor, he completed the Coliseum. The emergency relief he supplied to the victims and families of the Mount Vesuvius eruption was a logistic masterwork. Upon his death, the Romans deified Titus.

- To American Patriots: Friends, you have lost more than a day.37

12. Plutarch (46-120)

Plutarch was of Greek origin who became a Roman citizen. He is respected as a biographer, essayist, Platonist, and historian. Plutarch is best known for his *Parallel Lives* and *Moralia*.

- Concerning the possibility of Obama divorcing Michelle: A Roman divorced from his wife, being highly blamed by his friends, who demanded, "Was she not chaste? Was she not fair? Was she not fruitful?" holding out his shoe, asked them whether it was not new and well made. "Yet," added he, "none of you can tell where it pinches me."³⁸

- On Obama in thirty years: An old doting fool, with one foot already in the grave.⁴¹
- On Michelle Obama's beauty: When the candles are out all women are fair.42
- On Obama: There is scarce a man who knows little and speaks more. 43
- Concerning why the Democratic Party has no answers: The great-god Obama is dead.44
- *Obama about himself:* I am whatever was, or is, or will be; and my veil no mortal ever took up.⁴⁵

13. Epictetus (c.55-115)

Epictetus was a Greek wise man and Stoic philosopher. Born a slave at Hierapolis, he lived in Rome until banishment to Nicopolis in northwestern Greece. There he lived the rest of his life. Epictetus taught that philosophy is a way of life. It is not a theoretical discipline. Fate, which is beyond human control, determines all external events. Yet, at the same time, individuals are responsible for themselves and their own actions. A person can control his life through self-discipline. Suffering is caused by trying to control the uncontrollable and from neglecting the ramifications of our own power. Because humans live in a universal city, we have a responsibility to care for our fellow human beings. If one follows the principles one will live in happiness and have peace of mind. As such, his thinking was a pre-transcendental view.

- Obama about himself: Were I a nightingale, I would sing like a nightingale; were I a swan, like a swan. But as it is, I am a rational being, therefore I must sing hymns of praise to myself.⁴⁶

- On Obama's logic: Appearances to the mind are of four kinds. Things either are what they appear to be; or they neither are! nor appear to be; or they are, and do not appear to be; or they are not, and yet appear to be.⁴⁷

14. Juvenal [Decimus Junius Juvenalis] (c. 55-c 130)

Juvenal, was a Roman poet. He is best known as the author of the Satires. Juvenal wrote at least 16 poems in dactylic hexameter. They deal with an encyclopedic range of topics across the Roman world. The Satires can be read as a critique of pagan Rome.

15. Cornelius Tacitus (c.56 - c.120)

Publius (or Gaius) Cornelius Tacitus was a Roman senator and a historian of the Roman Empire. His two major works - the Annals and the Histories - survive in portions only. They examine the reigns of the Roman Emperors Tiberius, Claudius, Nero, and the Year of the Four Emperors. Thus they span the history of the Roman Empire from the death of Augustus in 14 AD to the death of Emperor Domitian in 96

AD. Some of the other writings by Cornelius Tacitus concern oratory (*Dialogus de oratoribus*), Germania (*De origine et situ Germanorum*), and the life of his father-in-law Agricola, which focuses on his campaign in Britannia (*De vita et moribus Iulii Agricolae*). Tacitus lived in the Silver Age of Latin literature, and as an historian he is highly regarded for his insights into the psychology of power politics.

- *On Obama's death:* The image *of Obama* was not carried before the bier; but for that reason it shone with preeminent luster. ⁵⁴
- Obama had talents equal to nothing.55
- Whatever is unknown is taken for marvelous; but now the limits of *Obama* are laid bare. ⁵⁶

16. Pliny the Younger [Gaius Plinius Caecilius Secundus] (c.61 - c.112)

Pliny the Younger was an ancient Roman author, lawyer, and magistrate. Pliny wrote hundreds of surviving letters. They serve as an invaluable historical source for Roman history during his time. Many are addressed to reigning emperors or to notables such as the historian, Tacitus. Pliny served as an imperial magistrate under Trajan who reigned between 98–117 AD. Pliny was an honest and moderate man, yet consistent in his pursuit of suspected Christians.

17. Suetonius [Gaius Suetonius Tranquillus] (c.69 - c.140)

Gaius Suetonius Tranquillus, was a Roman historian of the early Imperial era. He is known for *De Vita Caesarum*, a set of biographies of twelve successive Roman rulers from Julius Caesar to Domitian. In other works he presents the daily life of Rome, examines politics, and delineates oratory. He also wrote about the lives of famous writers, poets, historians, and grammarians.

- *Obots to Obama:* Hail, Emperor, we who are about *to be thrown under the bus* salute you.⁶¹

18. Hadrian [Publius Aelius Hadrianus] (76-138)

Hadrian was a humanist, philhellene (admirer of Greek culture) and Roman Emperor from 117 to 138 AD. He is best known for building Hadrian's Wall, which was the northern border of Roman Britain, for the re-building of the Pantheon, and the construction of the Temple of Venus and Roma.

- Obama to his conscience upon defeat in November 2012: Little soul, wandering, gentle guest and companion of the body, into what places will you now go, pale, stiff, and naked, no longer sporting as you did?⁶²

19. Ptolemy [Claudius Ptolemaeus] (c. 100-178)

Claudius Ptolemy was a Greek-Roman citizen who lived in Alexandria, Egypt. He wrote his works in Greek. He was an astronomer, astrologer, geographer, and mathematician. Ptolemy authored many scientific treatises, among them the astronomical treatise *Almagest* (*The Great Treatise*, originally *Mathematical Treatise*); the *Geography*, that discusses the geographic knowledge of the Greco-Roman world; and the astrological treatise *Quadripartitum* (in the *Apotelesmatika* or the *Tetrabiblos*, also known as the *Four books*), wherein he tried to adapt horoscopic astrology to Aristotelian natural philosophy.

20. Marcus Aurelius Antoninus (121-180)

Marcus Aurelius was Roman Emperor from 161 to 180 AD, ruling with Lucius Verus as co-emperor from 161 until Verus died in 169. He is considered to be one of the most important Stoic philosophers. Aurelius fought the Parthian Empire, the Marcomanni, the Quadi, and the Sarmatians with success. However, the Germanic tribes began to provide threats to the continuation of the Roman Empire. Marcus Aurelius wrote *Meditations* in Greek while on a military campaign between 170 and 180. His *Meditations* is a literary monument to a philosophy of service and duty. In the work he argues that humans can follow the rules of nature as a source of guidance and inspiration.

- *Obama on his being:* This Being of mine, whatever it really is, consists of a little flesh, a little breath, and the part which *plays golf.*⁶⁵
- On Obama's death: As for his life, it was a battle and a sojourning in a strange land; but the fame that comes after is oblivion. 66
- All is ephemeral fame and the famous as well. 67
- Obama on what happens when he wakes in the morning: In the morning, when I am sluggish about getting up, I let this thought be present: I am rising to a man's work to play golf.⁶⁸

- On what Obama cannot understand: One universe made up of all that is; and one God in it all, and one principle of being, and one law, the reason, shared by all thinking creatures, and one truth.⁷⁰

21. Galen (129 199)

Aelius Galenus or Claudius Galenus is better known as Galen of Pergamon, now modern-day Bergama, Turkey. He was a distinguished Roman of Greek heritage. A surgeon, physician, and philosopher, Galen was the most expert of all medical researchers of his age. His contributions lie in his studies of the scientific disciplines anatomy, physiology, pathology, pharmacology, and neurology, as well as philosophy and logic. He was a personal physician to many emperors. Galen theorized that the brain is the control center of all the motions of the muscles through cranial and peripheral nervous systems.

- *Obama should know that* the chief merit of language is clearness, and we know that nothing detracts more from this as do unfamiliar terms.⁷¹
- On why Obama is a failure: It was, of course, a grand and impressive thing to do, to mistrust the obvious, and to pin one's faith in things which could not be seen.⁷²

22. Diogenes Laertius (flourished c. 200)

Diogenes Laertius was a biographer of Greek philosophers. His work *Lives and Opinions of Eminent Philosophers* is a main source for the history of Greek philosophy. Absolutely nothing is known of his life.

- Time is the image of eternity.⁷³
- There is a written and an unwritten law. The one by which we regulate our constitutions in our cities is the written law; that which arises from custom is the unwritten law; that which comes out of Obama is madness.⁷⁴

23. Tertullian [Quintus Septimius Tertullianus] (c.160-240)

Quintus Septimius Florens Tertullianus, in English Tertullian, was an early Christian author from Carthage who is known as the Father of Latin Christianity and the Founder of Western Theology. He was the first Christian author who wrote an extensive body of Latin Christian literature. He is noted as a Christian apologist and a polemicist against heresy. He is one of the authorities who formulated an exposition of Trinitarian theology. At first his ideas were accepted as heresy by the Christian Church; later they became an integral part of orthodoxy.

- On a person's ability to see through Obama: O witness of the soul naturally Christian.⁷⁵
- *Obama will never learn that* truth persuades by teaching, but does not teach by persuading.⁷⁶
- Obama blushes when he lies. Truth does not blush.77

24. Saint Cyprian (??? -258)

Cyprian was bishop of Carthage. He wrote many Christian tracts and treatises, most of them extant. One of his important arguments is that Christ, in using the metaphor the rock, founded His Church on a single foundation so that it would manifest and secure unity. Peter is the foundation that unites the Church and binds it together. This principle follows each diocese with the bishop as a uniting ecclesial power. This single argument thwarted all heresies and schisms. Cyprian died a martyr at Carthage for refusing to recant his positions and for refusing to pay sacrifice to the pagan Roman gods.

25. Longus (Third Century)

Longus, sometimes Longos, is the author of the ancient Greek novel-romance Daphnis and Chloe. Little is known of his life. It is only an historical assumption that he lived on the isle of Lesbos, which is the setting for *Daphnis and Chloe*.

On Americans under Obama: They are so poor that they could not keep a doa.82

26. Constantine (c.288-337)

Constantine the Great (Constantine I or Saint Constantine) was Roman Emperor from 306 to 337, and the first Roman emperor to convert to Christianity. Constantine and his co-Emperor Licinius issued the Edict of Milan in 313. It proclaimed religious tolerance throughout the Roman Empire. As a Roman general, Constantine defeated the emperors Maxentius and Licinius during Roman civil wars. He was also successful in fighting the Franks, the Alamanni, the Visigoths, and the Sarmatians. He even resettled parts of Dacia that had been abandoned by previous emperors. Constantine built the new imperial residence in Byzantium and named it New Rome. In his honour, the people called it Constantinople. Later it became the capital of the Eastern Roman Empire and lasted for over one thousand years, until it was ravaged and sacked by the heathen Turks.

27. Ammianus Marcellinus (c.330-395)

Ammianus Marcellinus was a Roman historian. He wrote the ultimate major historical account of Rome that has survived. It is the history of Rome from 96 to 378, but only the sections that cover the period 353–378 are extant.

28. Saint Jerome (c.342-420

Saint Jerome (Eusebius Sophronius Hieronymus) was a Roman Christian priest, theologian and historian. He became a Doctor of the Church (Doctor of Christian Theology). Saint Jerome is best known for his translation of the Bible into Vulgate Latin. The Catholic Church and the Eastern Orthodox Church recognize him as a saint. In the Eastern Orthodox Church he is St. Jerome of Stridonium, or Blessed Jerome.

29. Vegetius [Flavius Vegetius] (flourished. c.375)

Publius Flavius Vegetius Renatus was a writer of the Later Roman Empire. Nothing is known of his life. His two surviving works are: *Epitoma rei militaris* (also titled *De Re Militari*), and *Digesta Artis Mulomedicinae*, a guide to veterinary medicine. Vegetius dedicated *Epitoma rei militaris* to the Emperor who is identified as Theodosius, (ad Theodosium imperatorem). This is disputable because some scholars identify this Theodosius with Theodosius the Great and others identify him with the later Valentinian III, although there is no apparent Theodosius nomenclature for Valentinian III.

- On how Americans should combat Islam: Let him who desires peace prepare for war.⁹⁶

30. Saint Augustine (354-430)

Augustine of Hippo (*Aurelius Augustinus Hipponensis*) is known as Augustine, St. Augustine, St. Augustine, St. Augustine, Blessed Augustine, and St. Augustine the Blessed. He was Bishop of Hippo Regius (Annaba, Algeria). He was a philosopher and theologian. His writings are exceedingly influential in the development of Western Christianity. Augustine believed that human freedom could be achieved only through the Grace of Christ. He is also important for his views on original sin

and just war. It is also to him that we owe the concept of the spiritual City of God, which is distinct from the city on earth. Augustine's book *City of God* is the Church community that worships God. For the Church he is a saint and a Doctor of the Church, as well as the patron of the Augustinian religious order. He is the patron saint of brewers, printers, theologians, and a number of cities and dioceses. He is also responsible for the alleviation of sore eyes. Protestants, particularly Calvinists, view him as one of the theological fathers of the Reformation because he taught salvation through divine grace. In the Eastern Orthodox Church he is referred to as Blessed Augustine, or St. Augustine the Blessed.

31. The Talmud (compiled c. sixth century AD)

The Talmud (Hebrew meaning *instruction*, *learning*, from the word root *lmd*, meaning *to teach*, *to study*) is a very important text of Judaism. The Talmud is a record of rabbinic discussions concerning Jewish customs, ethics, history, law, and philosophy. It has two parts: the Mishnah (c. 200 AD), a compendium of Judaism's Oral Law; and the Gemara (c. 500 AD), the basis for all rabbinic law and a discussion of the Mishnah as well as related Tannaim (teachings) on other subjects.

- On the American workers (employed and unemployed): The day is short, the labor long, the workers are idle, and reward is great, and the master is playing golf.⁹⁸

Alī ibn Abī Ṭālib (c.602-661)

Alī ibn Abī Ṭālib was the cousin and son-in-law of Mohammed. He ruled over the Islamic Caliphate from 656 to 661. Tradition says that he was the first male convert to Islam. Sunni Muslims consider Ali the fourth and final caliph. Shia Muslims consider Ali to be the first Imam and say that his descendants are the rightful

successors to Muhammad. They are all members of the *Ahl al-Bayt*, the *household of Muhammad*. It is because of this disagreement that the *Ummah* (world Muslim community) is split into the Sunni and Shia branches. According to Shia sources Ali was the only person born in the holiest place in Islam: the Kaaba sanctuary in Mecca. Ali's father was Abu Talib, his mother Fatima bint Asad. Ali was raised in Mohammed's household. Abu Talib had raised Mohammed. When Mohammed claimed that he had received a divine revelation, Ali accepted the message and dedicated his life to Islam. Ali followed Mohammed to Medina. Mohammed told Ali that God had ordered that Fatima, Mohammed's daughter, should become Ali's wife. Ali was extremely active in Islam. He led raiding parties of warriors to kill the non-believers, attacked caravans, and took many women as his personal property slaves.
