2. Charles V (1500-1558)

Charles V (Spanish: Carlos I, Dutch: Karel V, German: Karl V., Italian: Carlo V, French: Charles Quint, Turkish: Şarlken) ruled the Holy Roman Empire from 1519. 4. Sir Thomas Wyatt (c.1503-1542)

Sir Thomas Wyatt was a 16th-century English lyrical poet. He is credited with introducing the sonnet into the English language. He was born at Allington Castle, Maidstone, Kent – though his family was originally from Yorkshire. His mother was Anne Skinner. His father, Henry Wyatt, was one of Henry VII's Privy Councillors, remaining as a trusted adviser to Henry VIII when he became king in 1509. After his education at St John's College, Cambridge, Thomas Wyatt also became a member of the English court. None of Wyatt's poems was published during his lifetime.

5. John Bradford (c.1510-1555)

John Bradford, an administrator and canon of St. Paul's, was an English Reformer and martyr. He is best remembered for his statement *There, but for the grace of God, goes John Bradford*, said while imprisoned in the Tower of London when he saw a criminal on his way to execution. Bradford, a Protestant, was in the Tower of London for alleged crimes against Mary Tudor.

6. Ambroise Paré (1510-1590)

Paré is considered one of the fathers of surgery and modern forensic pathology. He had great skill in surgical techniques and battlefield medicine. His specialty was the treatment of wounds. of queen consort Catherine Parr. Vaux's wife, Elizabeth Cheney, was a first cousin of the sixth and final wife of King Henry VIII.

8. Richard Grafton (c. I513-1572

Richard Grafton was the King's Printer under Henry VIII and Edward VI. Grafton was a member of the Grocers' Company (1373-1376), which was previously known as the Guild of Pepperers, dating from 1180. In 1376, it was renamed the Company of Grocers of London. The organization had the responsibility of maintaining high standards for the purity and quality of spices, as well as for the legality of the official weights and measures. It is one of the Great Twelve City Livery Companies. It used to be the first of the twelve companies, until Queen Elizabeth I, who as Honorary Master of the Mercer's Company, found herself in a procession after her coronation, behind the Grocers' camel out of which came not-amused smells. As a result, the Mercers are now number one in the listing. In modern times the Company of Grocers of London is a charitable, constitutional, and ceremonial institution. Their motto is *God Grant Grace*. Among its members were also London's pharmacists. They formed the Worshipful Society of Apothecaries in 1617. Richard Grafton was also a member of parliament for Coventry.

9. John Knox (c.1513-1572)

John Knox, a Scottish clergyman and a leader of the Protestant Reformation, is known for bringing the Reformation to the Church in Scotland. Knox was educated at the University of St Andrews and was ordained as a Roman Catholic priest in 1536. Knox was involved in the ecclesiastical and political events centering on the murder of Cardinal Beaton in 1546, as well as the intervention of the regent of Scotland, Mary of Guise. Knox was taken prisoner by French forces the following year and exiled to England on his release in 1549.

10. Mary Tudor [Mary I] (1516-1558)

Her younger half-brother, Edward VI, succeeded Henry to the throne in 1547. By 1553, Edward was mortally ill. He attempted to remove Mary from the line of succession because of her opposing religious beliefs. On his death, Lady Jane Grey, their cousin, was at first proclaimed queen. Mary assembled a force in East Anglia, deposed Jane, and beheaded her. In 1554, Mary married Philip of Spain, and became queen consort of Habsburg Spain on his accession to the throne in 1556. Mary restored Roman Catholicism after the short-lived Protestant reign of her half-brother. In five years, over 280 religious dissenters were burned at the stake in the Marian Persecutions. Elizabeth I, her younger half-sister, reversed the re-establishment of Roman Catholicism in 1558.

 - 11. Joachim du Bellay (1522-1560)

Joachim du Bellay was a French poet, critic, and a member of the Pléiade, a group of 16th-century French Renaissance poets. The name refers back to the original Alexandrian Pleiad, seven Alexandrian poets and tragedians of the 3rd century B.C.. In 1323, a group of fourteen poets (seven men and seven women) in Toulouse called themselves the *Pléiade*. The pleiad is the seven stars of the Pleiades cluster.

- *The voyage of victory over Obama in November 2012:* Happy he who like Ulysses has made a glorious voyage.⁶⁰

12. Pierre de Ronsard (1524-1585)

Pierre de Ronsard was a French poet. He was a member of the Pléiade and was called the *prince of poets* by his French contemporaries.

13. Thomas Tusser (c.1524-1580)

Thomas Tusser was an English poet and farmer. His work *Five Hundred Points of Good Husbandry* (1557) is known as a book of daily instructions that records what to do during the year. The book gives the reader an insight into farming, customs and cultural life of Tudor England. In the book he also records ten qualities that English cheese must not have. They are:

- 1. Not like Gehazi (Elisha's servant), i.e., dead white, like a leper;
- 2. Not like Lot's wife, all salt;
- 3. Not like Argus, full of eyes;
- 4. Not like Tom Piper, hoven and puffed;
- 5. Not like Crispin, leathery;
- 6. Not like Lazarus, poor;
- 7. Not like Esau, hairy;
- 8. Not like Mary Magdalene, full of whey or maudlin;
- 9.Not like the Gentiles, full of maggots;
- 10. Not like a Bishop, made of burnt milk.
- *On Michelle and Barry:* Such mistress, such *a tart*, Such master, such *a fart*.⁶⁴

14. Gabriel Meurier (1530-1601)

Gabriel Meurier, also Meurir, was a famous French school master, grammarian, and linguist. He is known for *La grammaire françoise* (1557). He was one of the first to publish French dictionaries in the French-English and English-French format.

15. Henri Estienne (c.1531-1598)

Henri Estienne, also known as Henricus Stephanus, was a sixteenth-century French printer and classical scholar.

16. Elizabeth I (1533-1503

Elizabeth was queen regnant of England and Ireland from 17 November 1558 until her death. She was also called *The Virgin Queen, Gloriana*, or *Good Queen Bess*, Elizabeth I was the fifth and last monarch of the Tudor dynasty. Being the daughter of Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn, she was born a princess. Two years after her birth Anne Boleyn was executed and Elizabeth was declared illegitimate. Her halfbrother, Edward VI, willed the crown to Lady Jane Grey. This action prohibited his half-sisters from being royal successors. This was against English statute law. Consequently, Edward VI's will was not legal. Lady Jane Grey was executed. In 1558, Elizabeth, who had been imprisoned for nearly a year on suspicion of supporting Protestant rebels, succeeded the Catholic Mary I.

17. Michel Eyquem de Montaigne (1533-1592)

Lord Michel Eyquem de Montaigne was one of the most influential writers of the French Renaissance. His literary contribution was the essay, which he made into a literary genre. Montaigne is regarded as the father of Modern Skepticism, in which he was able to merge casual anecdotes and autobiography with serious intellectual speculation. The result is his *Essais*, sometimes translated as *Attempts*, which are some of the most influential essays ever written that found their successors in William Shakespeare, René Descartes, Blaise Pascal, Jean-Jacques Rousseau, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Friedrich Nietzsche, Stefan Zweig, Eric Hoffer, and even Isaac Asimov. During his day Montaigne was more widely known as a statesman rather than as an author.

- William Ayers, author of Obama's autobiography Dreams From My Father:

 I want to be seen here in my simple, natural, ordinary fashion, without straining or artifice; for it is myself that I portray. I am myself the matter of Obama's book.⁷³
- *On Obama:* Truly *the* man is a marvelously vain, diverse, and undulating object. It is hard to found any constant and uniform judgment on him.⁷⁴

- *Obama on fear:* The thing I fear most is *Michelle*.⁷⁵
- Obama's wish: I want death to find me drinking my Kool-Aid.⁷⁶

- Obama on his policies: I find that the best goodness I have has some tincture of vice.⁸⁶
- On Obama's leadership: Saying is one thing and doing is another.87

18. William I [William the Silent] (1533-1584)

William I, Prince of Orange, known as William the Silent, or William of Orange, led the Dutch revolt against the Spanish that ignited the Eighty Years' War, which ended in 1648 with the independence of the United Provinces. William was a wealthy nobleman who originally served the Habsburgs in the Spanish Netherlands as a member of the court of Margaret of Parma. The Spanish persecuted Dutch Protestants. William rebelled against his former masters. He became the leader of the Dutch in their fight against the Spanish. In 1580, the Spanish king declared William of Orange an outlaw. He was assassinated by Balthasar Gérard in Delft in 1584.

19. Mary Stuart [Mary, Queen of Scots] (1542-1587)

Mary, Queen of Scots, known as Mary Stuart or Mary I of Scotland, was queen regnant of Scotland from 14 December 1542 to 24 July 1567 and queen consort of France from 10 July 1559 to 5 December 1560. Mary Stuart was the only surviving legitimate child of King James V of Scotland. She was 6 days old when her father died. At the age of nine months she was crowned. In 1558, she married Francis, Dauphin of France. He became King Francis II in 1559, and Mary became queen consort of France until she was widowed on 5 December 1560. Mary returned to Scotland in 1561. In 1565, she married her first cousin, Henry Stuart, Lord Darnley. Their marriage was not happy. In February 1567, his residence was destroyed by an explosion, and Darnley was found murdered in the garden. It is believed that James Hepburn, Fourth Earl of Bothwell, was behind Darnley's death. He was brought to trial, but acquitted of the charge in April 1567. In May of 1567, he and Mary married. An uprising ensued. Mary was imprisoned in Loch Leven Castle. Under force, she abdicated in favour of her one-year-old son, James on July 24, 1567. She tried to

regain the throne, but was unsuccessful. She then fled to her first cousin once removed, Queen Elizabeth I of England. Elizabeth perceived her as a threat because Mary had previously claimed Elizabeth's throne. Many English Catholics regarded Mary as the legitimate Queen. Therefore, Mary was confined in many castles and manor houses in the interior of England for a period of 19 years and 9 months. Her life ended in execution, having been found guilty of being involved in plots to assassinate Elizabeth.

- Motto of Patriotic Americans: In Obama's end is America's beginning.⁹⁸

20. Jan Zamoyski (1542-1605

Jan Zamoyski was a Polish-Lithuanian nobleman, magnate, First Duke of Zamość, Royal Secretary since 1566, Lesser Chancellor of the Crown since 1576, Lord Grand-Chancellor of the Crown since 1578, and Grand Hetman (military commander) of the Crown since 1581, General Starost (Elder) of Kraków from 1580 to 1585, Starost of Bełz, Międzyrzecze, Krzeszów, Knyszyn and Derpsk. Jan Zamoyski was an important advisor to Kings Sigismund II Augustus and Stephen Báthory. Jan Zamoyski was one of the major opponents of Báthory's successor, Sigismund III Vasa. Summa summarum, he was one of the most skilled diplomats, politicians and statesmen of his time.

- Estimation of Obama: The king reigns, but does not govern.⁹⁹

21. Guillaume de Salluste, Seigneur Du Bartas (1544-1590)

Guillaume de Salluste Du Bartas was a French Huguenot poet who served under Henry of Navarre. His literary strength as an epic poet was writing in the Gascon dialect of the Occitan language in Southern France. For example, *La Sepmaine; ou, Creation du monde* (1578) was a hugely influential hexameral (six days of creation)

work that is an account of the creation of the world and the history of man. Translated into many languages, it inspired John Milton's *Paradise Lost*. Du Bartas wrote a sequel, *La Seconde Sepmaine* (1584), which remained unfinished due to illness.
