1. Giordano Bruno (1548-1600)

Giordano Bruno (Filippo Bruno), also called il Nolano because he was born in Nola, Italy, was an Italian astronomer, occultist, philosopher, satirist, mystic, and martyr. He was burned at the stake as a heretic.

2. Charles IX (1550-1574)

Day Massacre (1572), which was a concerted group of assassinations and Roman Catholic mob violence against the French (Calvinist) Huguenots.

3. Sir Edward Coke (1552-1634)

Sir Edward Coke, English barrister, judge and politician, was the outstanding jurist of the Elizabethan and Jacobean eras. Educated at Trinity College, Cambridge and study at the Inner Temple, he was called to the Bar on April 20, 1578. As a barrister he took part in several notable cases. As a member of parliament he served first as Solicitor General and then as Speaker of the House of Commons, eventually being promoted to Attorney General. He was the prosecutor in the Robert Devereux, Sir Walter Raleigh cases, and the Gunpowder Plot conspirators. For his service he was knighted, and then made Chief Justice of the Common Pleas.

- On the American Constitution: That Magna Carta is such a fellow that he will have no sovereign, except We the People.⁹

4. Sir Walter Raleigh (c. 1552-1618)

Sir Walter Raleigh was multi-talented as an English aristocrat, courtier, explorer, soldier, spy, writer, and poet. He made tobacco popular in England and its Colonies. Although the accusation was based on hearsay, Sir Walter Raleigh was tried for treason against King James I of England. He was beheaded on October 29, 1618. Engraved in the lid of his tobacco box was the Latin inscription: *Comes meus fuit illo miserrimo tempo* (It was my companion at that most miserable time).

During his age English poetry was in its birth pangs. It is to craftsman Edmund Spencer that English poetry became an internationally respected genre. He is one of the greatest poets in the English language.

France (1589 to 1610). Baptised Catholic, he and his mother Jeanne d'Albret, Queen of Navarre converted to Protestantism. Upon his mother's death he inherited the throne of Navarre. As a Huguenot, Henry was involved in the Wars of Religion. He barely escaped the St. Bartholomew's Day massacre. Later, he led Protestant forces against the Catholic French Royal Army.

He founded the Marischal College in Aberdeen in 1593, a protestant college as a counter institute to the Roman Catholic King's College in Old Aberdeen. It was George Keith who as ambassador to Denmark in 1589 arranged the marriage of King James VI of Scotland to Anne of Denmark. Keith was also Royal commissioner to the Parliament of Scotland in 1609.

9. Fulke Greville, Lord Brooke (1554-1628)

Fulke Greville, 1st Baron Brooke, *de jure* 13th Baron Latimer, and 5th Baron Willoughby de Broke, was known before 1621 as Sir Fulke Greville. He was an Elizabethan dramatist, statesman, and poet. From 1581 to 1621 he was a sporadic member of the House of Commons. In 1621 he received peerage, was made Baron Brooke, peer of the realm, and granted Warwick Castle. Greville served Elizabeth I and James I in the successive positions of Treasurer of the Navy, Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Commissioner of the Treasury. Today, Greville is best known as the biographer of Sir Philip Sidney. His poetry is extremely sober, presenting dark, thoughtful and distinctly Calvinist views on art, beauty, literature, and a variety of philosophical matters.

10. Richard Hooker (c.1554-1600)

Richard Hooker was an Anglican priest and an influential theologian. He placed emphasis on reason, tolerance, and the value of tradition. His views greatly influenced the Church of England. With Thomas Cranmer and Matthew Parker he is considered a founder of theological Anglicanism.

11. John Lyly (c. 1554-1606)

John Lyly was an English writer (poet, dramatist, playwright) and a politician. His best known books are *Euphues, The Anatomy of Wit* (1578) and *Euphues and His England* (1580). Lyly's literary style is known as *Euphuism*.

12. Sir Philip Sidney (1554- 1586

Sir Philip Sidney was an English courtier, soldier, and poet. He was one of the most prominent figures of the Elizabethan Age. His most famous works are *Astrophel and Stella*, *The Defence of Poetry* (also known as *The Defence of Poesy* or *An Apology for Poetry*), and *The Countess of Pembroke's Arcadia*.

13. François de Malherbe (1555-1628)

François de Malherbe, French poet, critic, and translator, was the eldest son of another François de Malherbe, *conseiller du roi* in the magistracy of Caen. François de Malherbe received his education at Caen, Paris, Heidelberg, and Basel. At the age of twenty-one he entered the household of Henri d'Angoulême, the illegitimate son of Henry II, governor of Provence. He served him as secretary in Provence, and married there in 1581. He lived partly in Provence and partly in Normandy for many years after the death of Henri d'Angoulême. Very little is known of his life during this period. His work *Larmes de Saint Pierre* (1587) is an imitation of Luigi Tansillo.

14. George Peele (1556-1596)

George Peele was an English dramatist. Probably his best recognized works are the pastoral comedy of *The Araygnement of Paris*, as well as *Famous Chronicle of King Edward the first, sirnamed Edward Longshankes, with his returne from the holy land.* Also the life of Lleuellen, rebell in Wales. Lastly, the sinking of Queen Elinor, who suncke at Charingcrosse, and rose again at Pottershith, now named Queenehith, *The Battell of Alcazar*, which is full of gore, and *The Love of King David and fair Bethsabe*. Among his more famous poems are *The Honour of the Garter*, *Polyhymnia, Phoenix Nest*, and *The Praise of Chastity*. *The Old Wives Tale* with its background of rustic folklore is a play within a play,

15. George Chapman (c. 1559-1634)

George Chapman, English dramatist and poet, was a renowned classical scholar of his age. Chapman has been called the rival poet of Shakespeare's sonnets. Chapman is best remembered as the translator of Homer's *Iliad* and *Odyssey*, and the Homeric *Batrachomyomachia*, a comic parody of the *Iliad*.

Greene published in many genres including an autobiography, plays, and romances, His fame also rested on a scandalous reputation.

- On an upstart Obama: For there is an upstart crow beautified with our feathers,

18. Francis Bacon (1561-1626)

After his political career ended in disgrace, he turned to science and his works, especially in philosophy and scientific method, greatly influenced the scientific revolution.

Bacon can be seen as the creator of empiricism because he established the Baconian Method, inductive methodologies for scientific inquiry. He demanded that scientists plan a thorough procedure when investigating all matters. In 1603, Bacon was knighted and created both the Baron Verulam in 1618, and the Viscount St Alban in 1621. He died without heirs and thus both peerages became extinct upon his death. The cause of his death was pneumonia, which he received while studying freezing and the preservation of meat.

- Obama is doomed to failure because he is narcissistically certain of himself: If a man will begin with certainties, he shall end in doubts; but if he will be content to begin with doubts he shall end in certainties.⁹³
- On the opposite of Obama's evil: Knowledge is a rich storehouse for the glory of the Creator and the relief of man's estate.⁹⁴
- Obama's politics are not praiseworthy: Politics was ever thought to have some participation of divineness, because it doth raise and erect the mind by submitting the shows of things to the desires of the mind.⁹⁵

- *Truthful reality under Obama:* There are and can be only two ways of searching into and discovering truth. The one flies from the senses and particulars to the most general axioms. ... This way is now in fashion. The other derives axioms from the senses and particulars, rising by a gradual and unbroken ascent, so that it arrives at the most general axioms last of all. This is the true way, but as yet untried.⁹⁷
- On Obama being classy: There are four classes of Idols which beset men's

minds. To these for distinction's sake I have assigned names – calling the first class, Idols of the Tribe; the second, Idols of the Cave; the third, Idols of the Market Place; the fourth, Idols of the Theater.⁹⁸

- Obama to the press on being defeated in November: I do plainly and

ingenuously confess that I am guilty of corruption, and do renounce all defense. I beseech *Americans* to be merciful to a broken reed.⁹⁹

19. Sir John Harington (1561-1612)

Sir John Harington (Harrington) was an author and courtier, as well as a master of art. It is to him that we owe the invention of the flush toilet. A member of Queen Elizabeth I's court, he was called her 'saucy Godson'.

His most famous work is a political allegory, *A New Discourse of a Stale Subject, called the Metamorphosis of Ajax* (1596). In it he attacks the *stercus* (excrement) of social poison and torture as well a libel that his relatives Thomas Markham and

Ralph Sheldon had experienced. In his *New Discourse* he described a forerunner to the modern flush toilet that was installed at his house at Kelston. His most famous political epigram is below.

- Treason under Obama: Treason doth never prosper: What's the reason? For if

it prosper, none dare call it treason.114

20. Robert Southwell (c.1551-1595)

Robert Southwell (Saint Robert Southwell), poet and clandestine missionary in post-Reformation England, was an English Roman Catholic Jesuit priest. He was arrested and tortured by Sir Richard Topcliffe, tried and convicted of high treason for his links to the Papacy. Southwell was hanged, drawn and quartered at Tyburn on February 20, 1595. He was canonized by Pope Paul VI as one of the Forty Martyrs of England and Wales in 1970.

- On Obama's regime: Times go by turns, and chances change by course,

From foul to fair, from better hap to worse.¹¹⁵

21. Samuel Daniel (c. 1562-1619)

Samuel Daniel was an English poet and historian. As a poet, he is mostly famous for his sonnets, which are different from the Italian sonnet form because they close with a couplet. *The Complaint of Rosamond*, is a soliloquy full of pathos that concerns the ghost of the murdered *Rosamund* bewailing her fate.

Additionally, some of his best stanzas are in *Epistles to Distinguished Persons*. Samuel Daniel is also regarded as the first poet to introduce terza rima (interlocking three-line rhyme scheme) into English poetry. The epistle to *Lucy, Countess of Bedford*, contains this rhyme scheme. His best dramatic work is *Hymen's Triumph*.

Daniel was a great verse innovator. His style is musical, but not splendid, easy and not stately. It is possible that he authored the anonymous play *The Maid's Metamorphosis* (1600)

22. Michael Drayton (1563-1631)

Michael Drayton was a prominent English poet in the Elizabethan era. He was the first English poet who wrote odes in the style of Horace. His most famous writings are *The Harmonie of the Church, Idea, The Shepheards Garland, Ideas Mirrour, Endimion and Phoebe*, the historical heroic poem *Robert, Duke of Normandy*, and *Mortimeriados*. Of enduring quality is *Englands Heroicall Epistles*, a series of (fiction) letters between famous lovers throughout English history.

23. Galileo Galilei (1554-1642)

Galileo Galilei was an Italian astronomer, mathematician, physicist, and philosopher considered the leader in the European Scientific Revolution. He is regarded as the *father of modern observational astronomy*, the *father of modern physics*, the *father of science* and the *father of modern science*. He improved the telescope which allowed him to make consequential astronomical observations and give support for the Copernican theory of the revolution of heavenly bodies. He confirmed the phases of Venus, discovered the four largest satellites of Jupiter (They are called the Galilean moons in his honour), and observed and analyzed sunspots. Galileo also worked in applied science and technology, inventing an improved military compass and other instruments.

Galileo's views and support of the theories of heliocentrism caused an investigation by the Roman Inquisition in 1615, the result of which said that that it could only be a possibility and not established fact. Galileo's defense appeared in *Dialogue Concerning the Two Chief World Systems*. The Inquisition tried him and he was found guilty for heresy. He was forced to recant. He spent the rest of his life under house arrest. It was at this time that he wrote *Two New Sciences* that are now called kinematics and strength of materials.

- A non-political statement of truth: Philosophy is written in this grand book - I

mean the universe – which stands continually open to our gaze, but it cannot be understood unless one first learns to comprehend the language and interpret the characters in which it is written. It is written in the language of mathematics, and its characters are triangles, circles, and other geometrical figures, without which it is humanly impossible to understand a single word of it; without these, one is wandering about in a dark labyrinth.¹¹⁹

- *On freedom:* But it does move!¹²⁰

24. Christopher Marlowe (1564-1593)

Christopher Marlowe, English dramatist, poet and translator during the Elizabethan era, was the most famous Elizabethan tragedian until his mysterious early death. He had a great influence on William Shakespeare, who became the eminent Elizabethan playwright upon Marlowe's death. Marlowe's plays have use of blank verse, and many protagonists.

Accused of blasphemy as the unproven author of a manuscript containing *vile heretical conceipts* (sic), warrant was issued for Marlowe's arrest on 18 May 1593. On 20 May he was brought before court and the Privy Council. Although there are no records that they met on that day, Marlowe was ordered to appear before them daily until "licensed to the contrary." After a period of ten days, he was stabbed to death by Ingram Frizer, an English businessman and confidence trickster.

26. William Shakespeare (1564-1616)

William Shakespeare, English poet and playwright, is considered to be the greatest writer in the English language and most probably the world's leading dramatist. As the Bard of Avon, he is England's national poet. His works that have survived are: 38 plays, 154 sonnets, two long narrative poems, and several other shorter poems.

Between 1585 and 1592, he was a successful actor in London and the owner of the acting group the Lord Chamberlain's Men, later King's Men. At about 1613, he retired to live in Stratford-on-Avon. Shakespeare produced most of his known work between 1589 and 1613. The early plays are mainly comedies and histories. These were followed by tragedies such as *Hamlet, King Lear, Othello,* and *Macbeth.* His last phase saw the appearance of tragicomedies, also known as romances: *Pericles, Prince of Tyre; Cymbeline; The Winter's Tale;* and *The Tempest.*
